




For Diploa in Pharmacy programs the evaluation of a candidate, for the academic performance in a course, shall be based on the performance in periodic sessional examination (ISE), Skill Competency examination (SCE) and End year examinations (ESE).

Periodic Sessional Examination (PSE): There is two sessionals conducted in a year.

Continuous Evaluation (CE): This shall be conducted by the course teacher throughout the semester and shall include evaluation of laboratory work, assignments, problem solving, group discussion,quiz,seminar,mini-projectandotheracademictoolsofevaluation. The course teacher shall announce the detailed methodology, for conducting the various segments of CE together with their weightages, at the beginning of the semester.

SkillCompetencyExamination(SCE):Itcomprisesofmini-projects, seminars, Simulations and model demonstrations to understand technical skills and presentations for soft skills.

End year/Final Examination (ESE): It is conducted at the end of year.

MonitoringofEvaluation

SCEshallbeconducted by the courseteacher and monitored by the Head of department. PSE and ESE shall be conducted by the Examination Section and monitored by Controller of Examination.

RulesofPassing

PR-1: To earn credits for a course (Theory/practical/oral/seminar/project/internship), the candidate must pass the course with minimum passing marks/grade ($\geq 40\%$ / > F Grade).


